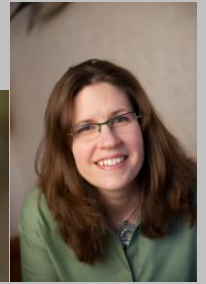

In 1975 Werts was convicted as an accomplice to a second-degree murder and sentenced to life in prison. After serving 36 years at SCI-Graterford, Werts' life sentence was commuted, due to the immense personal growth he experienced in the face of adversity. While in prison, he worked with Barb Toews on restorative justice efforts, including *The Little Book of Restorative Justice for People in Prison*. Both have a plethora of information to share from each perspective.

Restorative Justice is a perspective that creates processes for advancing the goal to address people's needs, promote accountability, and support all parties involved in a crime,
